2023 marked the 50th anniversary for Creative Community Living Services (CCLS) providing care and support to people with developmental disabilities, the frail, and elderly. We are indebted to the four men who many years ago had a vision that people with developmental disabilities had a right to better living conditions and to be part of the larger community.

Over the past five decades there have been changes to CCLS, including the restructuring of reimbursement, policies, rules, and regulations. However, the one constant we have stayed true to is the mission: *To establish individualized community support that will preserve and enhance the dignity and rights of those who rely on others while seeking their own level of independence.*

We also continue to have a strong commitment from our Board of Directors and staff, some who have been part of CCLS for many decades! We are fortunate to have individuals who care deeply about the people we assist and are passionate about improving their health and wellbeing.

In 2023, we celebrated our 50 years by hosting fun activities, including coloring contests, planting flowers, an ice cream social, a sock hop, and decorating quilt squares for the large and beautiful 50th anniversary quilt, which now hangs in the Watertown office. The activities culminated with an event held on October 11 at the Watertown Library bringing together community members, donors, staff, and sponsors to celebrate 50 years of commitment and support. Through this event, we were able to raise over \$10,000 that went to support the people we serve.

We also took some time to reflect on the past five decades and think about the future of the organization. The Board of Directors and staff believe in staying true to the organization's mission and becoming more innovative and growing our current services, including nursing, training, and quality assurance. To this end, we are embarking on a marketing campaign to reach new providers and businesses needing the services we provide.

As you read the annual report, you will learn more about the excellent work we do at CCLS and how over the past 50 years, we have continued to be a crucial partner in the developmental disability community. Your generosity and support continue to allow us to meet individuals where they are and provide the services they need to be part of the larger community.

We strive to be the premier provider of creative and innovative services reflecting excellence and integrity.


OUR PHILOSOPHY

OUR HISTORY

CCLS was incorporated on October 1, 1973, as the result of over a year of planning by four individuals—John Hunt, Jon Nelson, James Esmeier, and Joseph Bissen. The four believed that individuals with developmental disabilities would have a better chance of growing to their fullest potential if they were served in a small community setting rather than in an institution. Due to this innovative concept that was outside the status-quo of the time period, others were reluctant to take on this new opportunity. The four decided to form their own corporation for the purpose of providing community living arrangements for persons with developmental disabilities.



October 1973

CCLS (Christian Community Living Systems, Inc.) was incorporated, and the first program was opened on Mifflin Street in Madison, WI to serve eight women who had spent the first two decades of their lives at a state center.

1974

The second group home was opened in Milwaukee. In May, the first La Crosse group home also opened. Currently, CCLS manages 51 programs.

1987

CCLS (Christian Community Living Systems, Inc.) was changed to Creative Community Living Services, Inc. as a result of a "name the corporation" contest held in 1987.

2017

CCLS signs documents to become a nonprofit organization.

CELEBRATING 50 YEARS OF SERVICE









In 2023, we celebrated CCLS' 50th Anniversary! We celebrated all year long with monthly activities and with a 50 Years of Service fundraiser in October, the month CCLS was founded.

The fundraiser took place at the Watertown Public Library on October 11th. Speakers included CCLS CEO Kathleen Roach, CCLS Founder Jon Nelson, CCLS Board Chair Dave Morstad, and key note speaker Senator John Jagler. Thanks to our generous sponsors and through community donations, we raised over \$10,000 for our clients and programs.

FUNDRAISING HIGHLIGHTS

CCLS received three major grants in 2023. In April, Portage County awarded CCLS a \$30,000 grant. The funds from this grant and several other generous donations we received helped us purchase a new 15-passenger van for our day service program in Portage County.

The Greater Watertown Community Health Foundation awarded CCLS a Capacity Building Grant of \$15,500. We used the grant for strategic planning for our organization, which will allow us to maximize our impact in the future.

Finally, CCLS received a \$10,000 grant from the Wispact Foundation. This gift will help us purchase a new car for our program in Wood County.

On October 11, CCLS hosted 50 Years of Service, a fundraiser to celebrate our 50th anniversary, at the Watertown Public Library. Eighty people attended the event, including local government officials and leaders in the business community. Nineteen companies sponsored our 50th anniversary celebration, which raised more than \$10,500 in net income for CCLS.

Our 2023 Annual Fund Appeal mailing was also very successful. Our year-end appeal generated over \$5,000 in net income for CCLS from dozens of individuals, organizations, and companies.

Fast Pace Medical Staffing

In 2023, Fast Pace Medical Staffing, Inc. (FPMS) increased business by 3% overall from 2022. We focused on hiring quality staff and placing these professionals on contracts, rather than total number of staff hired. The year had many challenges, including sourcing and retaining quality talent, increasing efficiencies within the office, and staying ahead of the competition. As a team, we worked through these challenges and were able to end the year on a positive note with net profit of \$121,000.



Creative Living Environments (CLE)

In 2023, CLE operated three eight-bed CBRFs and one 20 bed CBRF. A highlight for the year is that we were able to secure rate increases through My Choice Wisconsin family care of 12% in each program. These increases assisted with CLE ending the year with a profit. The remodel for Clarion Manor was completed in the first quarter of 2023. Bayside received new flooring in all common spaces along with a few resident bedrooms. These improvements have made a drastic improvement to the community.

CLE made several staffing adjustments in the year. We added a program director to oversee the small CBRFs in the region. The van driver position was eliminated for the region. The Bayside manager position was reduced to part time evenings. The position was quickly filled and will improve resident care in the evenings and reduce expenses for the community.

CCLS Training

For 50 years, CCLS has supported individuals with a wide range of disabilities. Over the years, long-term care providers have come to rely on CCLS' experience to train their staff. CCLS has also been providing training to internal staff. In 2001, we expanded our training to outside agencies. Most recently, efforts have been made to expand training into new markets. In 2023, CCLS has further expanded training to additional audiences such as Corrections, Therapists and Child Welfare Facilities.



CCLS Nursing






In 2023, the CCLS Nurse Department made great progress in many areas. The Regional Nurses continued to practice a Preventive Model of Care by completing initial and annual body, pain, wandering, Braden scale and elopement risk assessments to all licensed clients. The Regional Nurses also visited each licensed program, at least monthly, and met with clients and the team and completed medication cart/cabinet audits. In addition to these visits, the Chief Nursing Officer also completed quarterly regional home visits to meet with clients and provided appreciation gifts to staff.

The Nurse Department also met the goal of generating and implementing a caregiver educational platform available to caregivers throughout CCLS. The educational platform provides protocols, quizzes, and answer keys for a variety of psychological and physiological disease processes. The fourteen topics chosen were determined through a companywide chart review audit, and from responses that were obtained through an anonymous CCLS survey. Some of these topics include Diabetes, Alzheimer's, Dysphagia, Urinary Health, and Bowel Health. Our 2024 goal is to increase the number of topics and their efficiency.


After much research and foundational work, in October Creative Nurse Consulting (CNC) opened to external organizations, offering nurse delegation services. CNC was marketed in Dane, Dodge, Jefferson, La Crosse, Milwaukee, and Waukesha counties with the aim to pilot in quarter 4. In October, the first contract was signed with an organization in Waukesha County, and in December a second contract was obtained with an organization in La Crosse County. In 2024, we plan to expand the nursing services that CNC offers throughout the state of Wisconsin.

















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
